FAREWELL DINGLEY VILLAGES' OWN BENDIGO **BANK COMMUNITY BUS**

You may have seen the Community Bus beetling around Dingley Village, which has been generously sponsored by the Bendigo Bank Dingley Village.

We have been very fortunate to have our own Village bus available for use by the residents and groups of Dingley Village for the last 13 years. All due to a wonderful partnership between the Dingley Village Branch of the Bendigo Bank, the City of Kingston and Dingley Village Neighbourhood Centre

Sadly, we have had to say farewell, as the bus has relocated to the City of Kingston Bus depot and will now operate under Council bus usage policy. It will still be available for hire by City of Kingston, not for profit community groups.

Why the change? Community buses now come under the new Victorian Government Bus Safety regulations, which requires a range of safety compliance processes including all groups using the bus being required to register as a "bus

operator". As you can guess, it all became too hard for local groups and community usage has dropped significantly. At the same time, the Bendigo Bank was undertaking their periodic review of sponsorships. As the Bendigo Bank provided the bus for Dingley Village community use, and as community use was dropping; they felt their funds could be better spent on other projects that benefit the Dingley Village community.

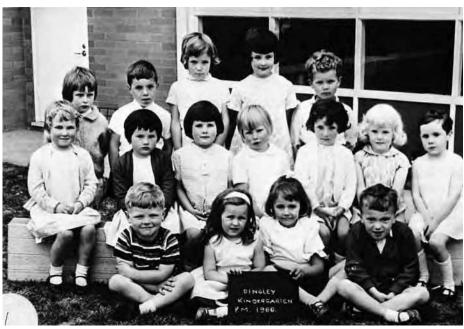

COMMUNITY MEETING – KINGSWOOD GOLF COURSE

Over 450 residents attended the packed community meeting on Tuesday 14th

August where concerns were heard about the proposed re-zoning and development of the Kingswood Golf Course.

The objection period has closed and we expect 5,000 objections will have been lodged with Council. The response from the Dingley Village community HAS BEEN MASSIVE.

What Happens Next? Kingston Council will consider all objections / submissions received and it is expected that Council Planning Officers will report to the Council Meeting on October 22nd. We urge you to attend. Council

will decide to proceed, or abandon the amendment or refer to an independent Planning Panel. The Minister also can abandon the application.

SPRING ROAD RESERVE DOG OFF-LEASH AREA -OFFICIALLY OPEN

After an extensive period of planning and construction, the Spring Road Reserve Dog Off-Leash Area is officially open for use. It will be the largest of its kind in the City of Kingston (more than 3 times the size of the MCG playing surface), and a great place for both dog owners and their beloved pooches to enjoy.

Since the old wire fencing was taken down, Spring Road Reserve has been a huge positive for Dingley Village. Activities like walking, running, bike riding, kite flying, ball sports, model plane flying, kite buggies and even dancing have been seen in the Reserve over the last couple of years. With the recent addition of gravel pathways throughout the Reserve, the future is looking bright for everyone young and old in Dingley's newest park.

WHERE IS THE DOG OFF-LEASH AREA?

Located in the northern end of the Reserve, between Abbeyfield House and McClure Road, with two zones – a small fenced zone next to Spring Road and a larger unfenced zone beside this. Clearly marked signage has been erected to advise the location of the Off-Leash Area boundaries.

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Responsible Dog Behaviour

Exercise, play and socialisation are important for the health and happiness of your dog. When your dog is off the leash it must still be under your control and you must keep your dog in sight and at a distance where it is able to hear and react to your commands. If you do not have complete control of your dog, it should be kept on the leash.

Please remember it is an offence under Section 26 of the Domestic Animals Act 1994 to not have effective control of a dog.

When your dog leaves the Off-Leash zone (fenced or unfenced), PLEASE ENSURE IT IS ON A LEASH.

All park users have equal rights to feel safe in the park and that is the reason why certain areas of the reserve have been designated either on-leash or off-leash.

Some people don't want to associate with dogs or don't want their young children near them. Other people are scared of dogs (no matter how small and friendly) or have allergic reactions whilst being around dogs.

The wetland areas close to the off-leash area are habitat for waterbirds, frogs and ground dwelling animals. All Australian native animals are protected under the Wildlife Act 1975 and therefore it is an offence to injure or disturb wildlife. There have also been numerous sightings of snakes in these areas, so it is advisable for you and your dog to be on-leash and to stay out of the wetlands.



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ROWAN ROAD CAR PARKING

Car parking for the Rowan Road netball courts and Dingley Tennis Club has been an issue for some time now and causing a lot of grief, not only for those who use the facilities but also for local residents as well as for motorists trying to enter/exit Dingley Village.

Council initially thought angled parking along Rowan Road would be sufficient to solve the issue. However, after extensive research, a petition and a meeting, Council has now committed to opening up the land in Spring Road Reserve opposite the netball courts on competition days and other large events. The Netball Association and Tennis Club have been informed and will discuss with Council how to implement these plans.

Congratulations Dylan Oakley from Southern Taekwondo, on two gold medals in the Under 9 Sparring Division, at the Taekwondo Victoria State Championships held on the 21st July.

Dylan started Taekwondo with his sister Hannah in September 2017 with great encouragement from their mother Emma, who was a very keen junior.



"We don't generally allow students to compete in sparring competition until they have had at least 12 months training, however due to Dylan's eagerness for competition coupled with his ability to learn and hard work we made an exception," said senior head coach David McGarity. Dylan competed in not one but two divisions, the under nine novice yellow belt division and the under nine blue belt division. His day was filled with a little nervousness, suspense and drama to say the least.

After arriving at 9.30am for registration along with 350 other competitors, Dylan began warming up only to discover

his first opponent was nowhere to be found. The opponents coach was franticly searching the venue for him only to learn he was at home in Caroline Springs watching television, his father having got the dates mixed up. 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SAFE COMMUNITY

Spring is here and a homeowner's mind turns to clean-ups and DIY around the house and garden.

However, did you know that in 2016/17, 26% of all injuries requiring hospital admission and 42% of injuries resulting in emergency department presentation occurred in the home?

The most common preventable injuries are from:

Falls from a ladder – people standing too high up the ladder, not keeping one hand holding the ladder, and losing their balance.

Power tools – causing hand and finger injuries and even amputation. Angle grinders and power saws are the worst offenders. Grinders cause about a fifth of all DIY injuries and power saws about 15 per cent.

Welding equipment – a frequent cause of eye injuries in people not wearing protective eyewear.

Lawnmowers – injuries caused by flying bodies like stones spat out by the blades, people pulling the lawnmower over their feet, or putting their hands under the lawnmower while the blades are still in motion.

Sharp blades – knives, chisels, saws and axes – causing lacerations and open wounds.

DIY injuries are usually caused by non-use of personal protective equipment, inappropriate tools, unsafe work practices and insufficient safety precautions. So this spring stay safe.

To give you an idea of how serious these injuries can be, Monash University's Accident Research Centre figures show that in Victoria alone there are about 1000 hospital visits, 500 hospital admissions and about 15 deaths a year from DIY injuries.

Support and Safety Hubs, known as The Orange Door, help women, children and young people experiencing family violence and families who need support with the wellbeing and development of their children.

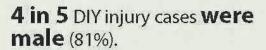
They help connect people directly to services and provide a coordinated response to a range of different needs, and where required a whole-of-family response, including holding perpetrators to account and working to help them change their behaviour.

The Orange Door provides services to people living in Bayside Peninsula, which includes Bayside, Frankston, Glen Eira, Kingston, Monington Peninsula, Port Phillip and Stonnington LGA's.

It is free to access help and support through The Orange Door and you do not need a referral.

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Mordialloc Freeway Update

Major Road Projects Authority now delivering the Mordialloc Freeway

In July 2018, the VicRoads Major Projects Division became a new dedicated authority, the Major Road Projects Authority (MRPA). MRPA is charged with planning and delivering the pipeline of major road projects for Victoria, including the Mordialloc Freeway.

The team delivering the project will not change; they just have a different name.

What has been happening?

Environment Effects Statement

The final scoping requirements, which outline the detailed studies that MRPA will carry out during the planning phase of the project, have been set by the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP).

The EES will focus on the potential impacts to:

- Biodiversity and habitat: migratory birds and the native vegetation when modifying grasslands and wetlands
- Surface water and ground water: quality of water flows and drainage in the Mordialloc Creek catchment and the Edithvale-Seaford Wetlands.
- **Noise and air quality**: increased traffic and noise for residents and nearby parklands, in addition to local air quality with exposure to vehicle emissions.
- Landscape and visual amenities: changes from bridges over interchanges and the wetlands.
- Traffic and transport: journey and road safety improvements.

The final EES documentation, including the outcomes of the technical studies, is scheduled for public exhibition in October 2018. DELWP invites the community to comment on the EES documentation through written submission.

Requests for Tender

The two shortlisted tenderers for the project - McConnell Dowell Decmil joint venture and CPB Seymour Whyte joint venture – have commenced the twelve-week tender process. Tender submissions for the project are expected to close in October 2018, with the preferred contractor to be announced shortly after.

WHY DOES THE VALUE OF MY SUPER FUND GO UP AND DOWN?

If you pay close attention to the value of your superannuation fund, and if, like most people, your money is spread across the main investment classes, you would have noticed that your retirement savings can both rise – and fall - in value. This can lead to some nervous times, particularly if you are close to or already in retirement.

What causes these ups and downs and can you do anything about them?

Start with how your fund is invested

For the most part, fluctuations in the balance of your super fund can be attributed to the portion invested in shares, and to a lesser extent, property. In general, the greater the exposure to the share market, the greater the volatility (i.e. the bigger the rises and falls) in the value of your retirement savings. So, what drives share prices?



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How much is an investment worth?

Let's compare two companies, A & B, and the profit per share that they are expected to generate:

Year	Company A Earnings per	Company B Earnings per
	share	share
1	\$1.00	\$2.00
2	\$1.20	\$2.30
3	\$1.25	\$2.50
4	\$1.30	\$2.70
5	\$1.40	\$2.85

Which company's shares would you pay more for?

The obvious answer is Company B's. Based on current information, it is projected to generate much higher earnings and is therefore worth substantially more per share than Company A. That's because, in very simple terms, an investment is worth the sum total of all of its future earnings.

It's not quite that simple

Of course, there's a catch: the future is a very uncertain place.

What if next year Company B announces that its profit is only \$1.50 per share? Suddenly it looks much less valuable, and as a result, its share price should fall. However, company profit announcements aren't the only things share analysts look at. They examine all sorts of issues in an attempt to anticipate what a company's future earnings will be. Some are specific to the company, such

as a change in CEO or launch of a new technology, whereas changes in interest rates or a jump in unemployment can affect the whole share market.

Opinions matter

Aside from hard numbers, opinions count for a lot too. One investor may think that the fossil fuel era is coming to a close, that the earnings of coal and oil companies will fall and their share prices will drop. Another investor may think that the world will increase its demand for fossil fuels and expect those same companies to rise in price.

It is the collective opinion of all these analysts and share traders that set the momentary price of any given share. The combination of these collective opinions on the prices of the shares held by your super fund then determines how much your retirement nest egg changes in value.

This doesn't mean that share price movements always appear logical. A company can report a stellar profit and still have its share price hammered if the market was expecting an even better result.

What to do?

The impact of share price volatility can be moderated by good diversification and by allocating a smaller fraction of the portfolio to shares. Just be aware that the latter can also reduce the potential longterm returns from your portfolio.

If the ups and downs in the value of your super fund are concerning you, or if you would just like to check if you are still on the right track, your licensed financial adviser will be able to assess your situation and point you in the right direction.

GOLFING INJURIES- CAN THEY BE PREVENTED?

Many people consider golf a low-level physical activity without the possibility of injury ever happening to them. Nonetheless as with any sport there is the potential for acute or chronic injuries to occur. The most common sites for injuries to golfers include the low back, shoulders, elbows, hands and wrists.

In one survey that looked at golf injuries in amateur golfers, approximately one third of golfers had suffered low back injuries. Tiger Woods missed the 2014 US Masters with a back injury. Elbow injuries were also particularly prevalent with a similar number of elbow injuries reported. Injuries to the hand, wrist and shoulders occurred less frequently however were still a common complaint.

Golf injuries can occur at any time but are most likely due to overuse, striking the ground with the club or poor swing mechanics. Inadequate warm up is also a contributing factor to injuries sustained through golf. There is a higher incidence of injuries in golfers over 50.

As Physiotherapists, we see our fair share of golfing injuries and ensure thorough assessment and treatment using local anti-inflammatory modalities, stretching, strengthening and advice on return to sport and injury prevention. However, there are things that you can do in order to help prevent injuries occurring.

LOW BACK.

Injuries to the low back can occur due to increased rotation of the shoulders during back swing. Try to ensure that the hips



and shoulders rotate similar amounts to prevent injuries from too much rotation of the spine. It is also important to make sure you are warmed up prior to play by performing some practice strokes. Start with a small back swing working up to a half stroke and then to a tee shot. With each shot, you will progressively increase the amount of rotation that occurs through your trunk.

Lower back stiffness can also be a warning sign to back pain. Therefore back extension in the form of leaning back in standing or back arching as well as back arching on the floor lying on your stomach and pushing up through your arms can help this stiffness before it develops into something more debilitating.

ELBOW

'Golfers' Elbow is a common complaint that can occur in an acute incident i.e. hitting the ground during swing or as an overuse injury through poor technique or equipment. Treatment includes stretches, strengthening and anti-inflammatory modalities. Some people can find relief from a counter force brace that we can supply here at Physiochoice. Larger club grips and lighter shafts can also be of assistance.

As with any sport, it is important to include a sport specific warm up prior to play in order to help prevent injury. Warm up initially with a few minutes walking and then begin golf specific stretches and activities such as trunk rotation and shoulder exercises followed by some practice shots prior to teeing off. Improving your general fitness can also help with reducing the risk of injury.

If you have any concerns or are worried about your golfing injuries or pain, then it is important to get the advice of a health professional such as a physiotherapist, as there are probably many things that you can do in order to make playing more comfortable.

LOOKING LOANS



CHANGES TO CREDIT SCORE REPORTING

If you have a credit card or a loan, or have even just applied for either, you have a credit history.

What you may not realize is that what is recorded on your credit history has changed as of 1st July 2018.

WHAT'S HAPPENING?

Previously, lenders only shared negative information such as defaults, bankruptcy, court judgments, along with listing applications for credit. There was no report stating if you paid your bills on time or late, only reports of more serious problems. Under the new system, credit providers will also have to share positive information, such as when you made all your repayments.

HOW DOES THIS AFFECT ME?

A history of making regular payments, repaying a loan early or closing unused accounts (such as excess credit cards) can now help you demonstrate your creditworthiness and increase your ability to obtain credit. Good money managers will now be given more recognition, and ultimately rewarded with better access to finance.

On the other hand if you are in the habit of paying bills one week past due date, this will in future impact your ability to obtain a loan.

WHAT TO DO?

Your repayment history now counts, paying bills on time is important! We recommend setting up direct debits where possible to avoid missing due dates.

Only apply for credit when you need it – do your research before any application, less enquiries are better for you (that is the value of a broker, who will do the

research for you across multiple banks without multiple credit enquiries).

Monitor your credit file and credit score (it costs nothing) and keep an eye out for errors or fraudulent activity on your file. If you have a history of paying all your bills on time, that is great! Keep up the good record; you will be rewarded for it.

If on the other hand you have been guilty of making late payments at times, this is your chance to take charge, and amend your habits before it is too late. This credit reporting is commencing now, and note data is held for 2 years on your file.

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BLENDED FAMILIES AND ESTATE PLANNING

A blended family is a family in which one or both partners have a child or children from a previous relationship. The nature of this type of family can cause complex issues upon the death of one of the partners, particularly having regard to the needs of the individuals in the family, and the financial intermingling of the partners through the deceased's lifetime.

THE COMMON ISSUES

Typical issues that can occur in this type of family relate to the competing interests of your spouse, your children and stepchildren including:

- The continuing financial needs of minor children upon the death of a parent;
- 2. The desire to ensure adult and/or minor children from a previous relationship are financially provided for upon your death;
- 3. Ensuring your spouse is financially provided for upon your death; and
- 4. The desire to avoid potential issues between family members upon your death.

It is also important to consider in situations where you and your spouse own property together, whether you wish that share of your property to transfer to your spouse, or whether you wish your share of the property to be for the benefit of your children.

These issues can be minimised by having an open conversation with your spouse as to estate planning matters and seeking appropriate legal advice.

Dying without a will – Laws of Intestacy

Should you fail to deal with these issues throughout your lifetime and you die without a valid will (that is die 'intestate'), the Administration and Probate Act 1958 (Vic) provides a strict legal process for the division of your estate upon your death. In brief, the current intestacy laws, when considering blended families, provides that if the value of residuary estate* is worth more than the current statutory legacy of \$451,909 then broadly:

- 1. Your spouse will receive all your personal chattels**, the statutory legacy of \$451,909 plus any interest and half the balance of your residuary estate;
- 2. Your child or children from previous relationships will share in the remaining half of the residuary estate; and
- 3. Your spouse will also have the option to elect to acquire your real property, if any, from your estate at its value from the date of your death.

Depending on the individual circumstances of your family, the above process may not adequately fulfil your wishes as to the division of your assets upon your death.

The Need for a valid Will

In order to ensure that upon your death your assets are divided and/or transferred in accordance with your wishes, and not subject to the statutory process of intestacy, you must have a valid Will.

The making of a Will in these complex circumstances means there may be a number of options to consider including:

- 1. The nomination of beneficiaries of any superannuation and/or life insurance policies;
- 2. The manner of holding of any real property you currently own and the effect your death will have on this to the individuals who reside in the property;
- 3. Providing specific gifts to your children and/or spouse under your

- Will to ensure they are provided for adequately upon your death;
- 4. Providing your spouse with a life interest to continue to reside in the real property upon certain conditions until their death. Upon the death of your spouse the property would then be dealt with according to the provisions of your Will; and
- 5. Whether it is necessary to appoint a guardian for a minor child, and who would be best suited to this role.

The considerations of how to deal with your estate upon your death will be entirely dependent on your personal circumstances.

What Next

Although a daunting process, careful estate planning, especially obtaining advice from a competent solicitor who understands these issues and practices in this area, can address and alleviate the issues previously discussed.

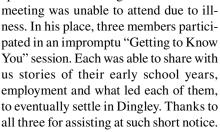
