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YOUR RATES AT WORK

Kingston Council has released its Draft Budget for 2019/20, which provides details on the continued delivery of high quality services, maintaining the City's infrastructure and delivering exciting new projects that will help to strengthen our community.

Mayor Georgina Oxley said the proposed budget commits \$221 million towards services for the City's 163,400 residents, which range from (but are not limited to) weekly waste collection, operating the City's libraries, manning school crossings across Kingston, providing more than 15,000 immunisations, more than 100,000 community care hours; and the maintenance of 367 parks, 60 sports grounds and 114 playgrounds.

There has also been \$81.6 million allocated to capital works. This program will promote an active and healthy community through major investments in accessible open spaces and sporting facilities to strengthen local clubs and encourage greater participation.

Budget Highlights for Dingley Village include investing in high-quality sport and community facilities with the Dingley Village Library/ Neighbourhood Centre precinct redevelopment (\$3.7m) that includes an upgraded library, new outdoor space, improved community meeting rooms, new kiosk/kitchen and reception and new Maternal and Child Health rooms.

The first stages of improvements at Chadwick Reserve (\$1.7m) to meet growing demand for junior AFL facilities. A larger pavilion, female-friendly change rooms, disability access, umpire's facilities, community room and a new playground and shared paths will be provided.

The Draft Budget 2019–20 includes significant investments in environmental upgrades," said Cr Oxley. "Although the cost of recycling continues to rise, Council will only pass on a waste increase of approximately \$6 household and have allocated \$1.5 million to introduce food organic waste disposal (FOGO) in 2019–20; along with the funding needed to plant an additional thousand trees across the City."

There are many other highlights featured in the City of Kingston Draft Budget 2019-2020, which include:

Enhancing our foreshore by rebuilding the Edithvale, Aspendale and Mentone Life Saving clubs and the Mentone Precinct Open Space Project.

Supporting our community by increasing the pensioner rate rebate to \$110 and waiving overdue library fees for students.

Continuing the City's commitment to advocate and introduce new measures to support the disadvantaged, including a \$265,000 investment in the Family Violence Action Plan and \$50,000 towards gambling advocacy.

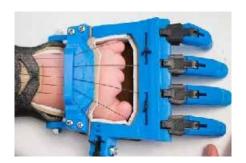

wants your input. Representation reviews look at the electoral structure of a local council. This includes:

- if the council has the right number of councillors per voter.
- if the council should be one large area (unsubdivided) or made up of wards (subdivided).
- if subdivided, how many wards, what ward boundaries and how many councillors each ward should have.

You can tell the VEC your views in writing or you can draw a map of how you think the council should be made up. This is known as a submission. ARE THREE STOREY HOUSES COMING TO DINGLEY VILLAGE?

In the recently released draft Housing and Neighbourhood Character Study, most of Dingley Village residential areas have been designated Limited Change Area zoning, with a 2 storey height limit on future housing.

However for a significant part of Dingley Village, a different zoning has been proposed - Incremental Change Area zoning - which allows future housing of up to three storeys high.

Consequently, medium density 3-story blocks of flats could be built all along Centre Dandenong Rd, on the Kingswood Golf Course Driving Range and around Dingley Village shopping centre, including the streets adjacent to Corrigan Oval,

which will overstrain our infrastructure and destroy our unique Neighbourhood Character.

To stop large-scale medium density housing development in our Village, DVCA urges you to object against the Incremental Change Area zoning proposed for:

- any areas more than 400 metres away from the Dingley Village shopping centre, and
- the Kingswood Golf Course driving range

A TALE OF TWO RETIREMENTS – WHICH WOULD YOU CHOOSE?

Sam and Sally Smith have worked hard all their lives, paid their taxes and, now they have retired, they feel they are entitled to a full age pension.

Jan and Jim Jones have also worked hard and paid their taxes. However, concerned that Australia's aging population and ballooning pension bill will make it increasingly difficult to qualify for an age pension, they have sought to be as financially independent in retirement as possible. With diligent savings and smart use of superannuation they have built a significant nest egg.

While both couples have equally valid views, in one respect Jan and Jim have already been proven correct with changes to the assets test from 1 January 2017 reducing the number of people qualifying for a part pension and some losing it altogether.

What matters most?

This leaves would-be pensioners asking themselves: what matters most? Clawing back the tax paid over their working lives, or living the most comfortable lifestyle they can?

Several strategies can help boost the level of age pension, but these usually

involve reducing the level of financial assets assessed by Centrelink which can deny pensioners both the income those assets could otherwise generate and capital withdrawals.

The Smiths might, for example spend up big on home improvements, give money away to their family within allowable limits, and take an expensive overseas holiday. Once back home they might then qualify for a full age pension of \$36,301 per annum ¹. That's close to the amount (\$39,775 pa ²) that the Association of Superannuation Funds of Australia (ASFA) calculates is sufficient for a "modest retirement" for a 65-year-old couple. That is, "only able to afford fairly basic activities."

Things aren't quite as bleak as that. The income test allows Sam and Sally to earn a combined \$7,904 per year ³ and still receive a full pension, but that total of \$44,205 pa leaves them quite a way short of being able to afford a "comfortable" lifestyle. ASFA defines this as one that "enables an older, healthy retiree to be involved in a broad range of leisure and recreational activities and to have a good standard of living through the purchase of such things as; household goods,

private health insurance, a reasonable car, good clothes, a range of electronic equipment, and domestic and occasionally international holiday travel." For a 65-year-old couple, this is estimated to cost \$60,977 pa.

The self-funded alternative

That's more the kind of lifestyle the Joneses have in mind, even if it means not qualifying for any age pension. Freed from the need to watch every dollar and to report any changes in their circumstances to Centrelink, an inheritance, for example, they are also insulated from the impacts of any future changes to the age pension.

Start early and plan well

Unfortunately, many people retiring today don't have a choice and, dependent on the age pension, they will be denied that comfortable retirement. The key is to start retirement planning as early as possible. Pensions and superannuation are complex areas, so it is essential to obtain detailed and personalised advice from a qualified financial adviser. Take control of your future now.

LOOKING AT LOANS



TOP 5 REFINANCE MISTAKES

Interest rates are at record lows, with rates below 4% now expected. This has home owners and investors lining up to refinance their mortgage loans.

Are you in a financial position to refinance? If so, take the time to do it right. Avoid the temptation to simply re-write what is in place. If you have been thinking about doing it why are you waiting? Note 5 common mistakes to be aware of and avoid:

- 1) Error number one is waiting until you are doing it tough before looking at trying to save on the mortgage. You should refinance in the good times to prepare for the bad times. You may have heard the saying "Banks are only happy to hand out a loan if you do not really need it". That is more true than funny. Use the good times to plan ahead. If you can comfortably afford to pay the high rate, we can comfortably position you into a better rate.
- 2) Automatically refinancing with your current bank without shopping around ignores the competitive environment. First preference for any person is to maintain their primary banking where it is, however why do this without considering the alternative? A mortgage broker will do the comparison work for you, negotiate the best possible deal, and give you the choice of available options. That may result in your broker arranging a better deal at your existing bank, or you

may decide to move, and take your good credit history with you.

- 3) Rate is not everything. Fees and charges, upfront and ongoing, must be taken into account. Honeymoon rates which revert to a higher rate after an initial introductory period add to the complexity. Some offers which sound too good to be true are that good, others have hidden traps. It is not easy to fully understand the hidden detail, you need an expert you can trust investigating and explaining it to you.
- 4) Waiting for interest rates to drop / start going up. From a market timing perspective, refinancing to a better rate is a bit like buying property, the best time to do it was yesterday. If refinancing is appropriate for your individual circumstances, then do it now, do not procrastinate.
- 5) Ignoring other important considerations. Refinancing is not just about loan costs. There are many other life issues to be considered. 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THE HEART OF THE MATTER



- People with diabetes are between two and four times more likely to develop heart disease.1
- Heart disease is the number one cause of death for people with type 2 diabetes. It is responsible for just almost two-thirds of all deaths in people with diabetes.²
- Between one and three per cent of people with type 2 diabetes experience a heart attack every year.³ That means that in a given year between 11,000 and 33,000 Australians will suffer a diabetes-related heart attack.

- Almost two-thirds of Australian adults with type 2 diabetes self-report some form of cardiovascular disease.⁴
- People with diabetes may develop heart disease 10 to 15 years earlier than people without diabetes.⁵

ASSESSING YOUR ENTITLEMENT ON SEPARATION

In the unfortunate circumstance where you separate from your partner, turning your mind to your property and financial entitlement may not be foremost in your mind as your will likely be trying to manage other pressing emotions and needs.

However, you will need to turn your mind to your property and financial needs sooner rather than later even at the risk of this issue adding a further layer of emotions and tension to the situation.

Where the parties have children under 18, there should be agreement which is ideally formalised in relation to their custody, care and maintenance. This article will not consider the parenting related issues or other non-property related issues.

Where you and your partner cannot reach an agreement as to the equitable division of your property, we strongly advise that you seek guidance from a competent family lawyer even if as a one off consultation. In this regard, although you may be getting a lot of 'advice' from family and friends, often, well-meaning as they are, such advice is not necessarily correct or appropriate from a legal perspective.

The Asset Pool

An initial consideration by your family lawyer should be to ascertain a complete picture of the property pool that you and your partner have including your liabilities. The Family Law Act 1975 ("the Act") defines property widely to include real estate, furniture, cars, boats, money,



shares, superannuation, assets in partnership, in trust or held in companies.

There may be disagreement regarding what should/should not be included within the property pool and the values of these assets and liabilities as at the date you are undertaking the exercise. One should approach this aspect of discussions as a commercial negotiation and, difficult as it may be, try and restrict attaching emotions to it as this usually complicates and hinders the discussions.

Full and Frank Disclosure

To ensure the property pool is determined factually, there is usually an obligation of full and frank disclosure of all financial information. For matters that are in court, this obligation is a legal requirement in the Act. However, it is also a matter of practice prior to a dispute reaching the courts as this assists the negotiation process and may enable you and your partner to reach a settlement without the need for costly litigation.

It is pursuant to this obligation, family lawyers usually request parties provide them with bank statements, valuations, pay slips, tax returns, superannuation statements, any Wills of which they are a beneficiary etc.

Contributions

Once the property pool determined and agreed upon, your entitlement should be calculated by way of an assessment of the contributions you and your partner made prior to and throughout the course of your relationship.

For family law purposes, there are multiple types of contributions:

- 1. Direct financial contributions

 These are financial contributions
 such as wages and salary made by
 you or your partner to the acquisition
 of assets, their preservation, maintenance or improvement. Assets you
 owned prior to the relationship will
 also be taken into account.
- **2.** Indirect financial contributions These are contributions such as gifts and inheritance that indirectly assists

- with you and your partner's financial position.
- 3. Direct and indirect non-financial contributions These are contributions that essentially increase the size of the net asset pool. For example, using one's own labour and skills to maintain or improve property belonging to the parties;
- **4.** Contributions to the welfare of the family such as contributions as a homemaker, a parent raising the children or towards home-duties.

It should be stressed that for legal purposes no type of contribution is necessarily more important than another type.

Future Needs

The future financial needs of you and for former partner should then be assessed with consideration being made to your age, health, financial resources, earning capacity and, where applicable, who has primary care of the children.

For example, if you have a disability and cannot work or your capacity to do so is very limited, you have greater long term needs and therefore may require support in the form of an increased share of the property pool.

The financial position of any new partner, where applicable, may also be taken into account.

When taking into account of the matters set out above and in working the basis of any property settlement the law requires the overarching consideration to be whether any determination will be 'just and equitable' in all the circumstances of the parties and that any final division is fair. This requires the issues listed above be considered equally. There is no factor that is automatically awarded priority over another and every case is determined on its own particular circumstances.

MYOPIA (SHORT-SIGHTEDNESS): BECOMING AN EPIDEMIC?

"When was your first eye test?" - is a common question I find myself asking many patients when I see them. It might seem strange, and maybe irrelevant if you've been having regular eye tests; but according to the recently published *Australia and New Zealand Child Myopia Report* – A Focus on Future Management, 31% of Australian children aged 0-17 years old, have never had their eyes tested by an optometrist.

Vale John Glenn, the like of you will rarely be seen again.

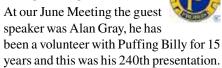

Today it is a major tourist attraction with 520,000 passengers recorded last year.

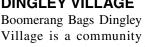

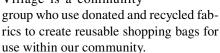
