### **KEEP SAFE THIS WINTER**

Winter is here and that means products like heaters, electric blankets, hot water bottles and heat packs are coming out of storage or being purchased. These products don't just pose a safety risk if used or stored incorrectly, they can become unsafe when used together, or with other products.



#### Smoke alarms

Each year, more than 50 people across Australia die from house fires and many more are injured. Most of the homes do not have working smoke alarms. Only working smoke alarms can provide early warning and time to escape. You lose your sense of smell when you are asleep. A working smoke alarm reduces your chance of dying in a house fire by half.



#### **Electric blankets**

If you remove your electric blanket once the colder months are over, always store it rolled up, not folded. Inspect it before use and look for frayed fabric, exposed elements, damaged cords or scorch marks before using it again. If you notice any damage to your electric blanket, throw it away. Damaged or faulty electric blankets can cause an electric shock or fire hazard.



#### Children's clothing

Children's clothing and nightwear with a 'low fire danger' label is still flammable, so always keep children away from open heat sources, like fireplaces and heaters. Multiple children are admitted to hospital each year due to their clothing catching fire.

#### Heaters

Heaters need to be checked every year, no matter how old they are. Make sure there are no exposed wires or loose connections on the cables. Only use one appliance per power point and switch each one off when not in use. Gas heaters must be vented adequately as the carbon monoxide produced when the gas is burnt is odourless, colourless and deadly. It is particularly important to have gas heaters serviced regularly by a qualified tradesperson to ensure that there are no carbon monoxide leaks. Never use a gas heater or BBQ made for outdoor use inside your home.

#### Fireplace

Regular maintenance of fireplaces, combustion heaters, flues and chimneys must be undertaken by a qualified person a minimum of once a year (at the start of winter) to ensure that the heater or fireplace works properly and safely.

#### Winter Safety Reminder

With winter approaching, we start using heaters and other equipment to stay warm, but to be safe we need to remember:

- Check all heaters gas and electric at the start of every winter for wear and tear, and safe operation.
- Ensure that heaters are in a safe, stable location where people or pets can't accidentally knock them over.
- Check electric blankets thoroughly faulty blankets can overheat, cause a shock, burn or start a fire. Inspect it by laying it out flat on the bed, turning it on and checking for hot spots.
- Roll electric blankets rather than fold them when not in use.
- Use hot never boiling water to fill hot water bottles.

- Replace hot water bottles at least every two years. They may look OK, but the rubber could be perished on the inside.
- Wrap hot water bottles in a towel or pillow case to avoid direct contact with skin.

#### **Accessible Parking Permits**

Victoria's disability parking permit system has changed with the introduction of the Accessible Parking Permit (APP) scheme by the Victorian Government.

The new system is a fairer system for allocating disabled parking permits and better aligns with the Australian Disability Parking Permit Scheme (ADPS).

If you require a new permit or your current permit is about to expire, you will need to apply using the new application process.

#### Requiring a new permit

- 1. Start your application online at accessibleparking.vic.gov.au
- 2. You'll receive an application reference number via text message (SMS) to a mobile phone.
- 3. Take your reference number to your GP or occupational therapist.
- 4. Your GP/occupational therapist completes an assessment and submits the application online.
- 5. Your local council reviews the application.
- 6. If your application is successful, you'll receive your permit in the mail.

#### **Replacing a Lost Permit**

- 1. Complete a statutory declaration to formally declare the permit is missing.
- 2. Start your replacement application online at <u>accessibleparking.vic.gov.au</u>
- 3. You'll receive a replacement application reference number via text message (SMS) & email
- 4. Your local council reviews the application
- 5. If your application is successful, you'll pick up the permit from your council and will need to provide the statutory declaration at time of collection.
- 6. If you don't have access to a mobile phone or the internet, please phone our customer service centre on **1300 653 356** to discuss other options for completing the form.

#### Kingston Draft Budget focuses on high-quality services and facilities

Kingston Council has released a Draft Budget for 2021–2022 which prioritises delivering a broad range of highquality services and maintaining vital infrastructure, while investing in exciting new projects that will help to strengthen our community.

Mayor Steve Staikos said the proposed draft budget will continue to build a strong, connected Kingston community. "This budget enables us to continue to deliver all the essential services our community expects while also investing \$74.4 million in new projects across our city," said Cr Staikos.

"This Draft Budget has been carefully developed to ensure our community has access to well-maintained quality infrastructure, that our local sports clubs are supported, accessibility upgrades continue to be rolled out across the municipality and our children have access to quality early years learning." Cr Staikos said Council had worked hard to deliver a financially responsible budget and is well-placed to meet the Victorian Government's rate capping policy of 1.5%.

The Draft Budget's \$74.4 million capital works program focuses on delivering a wide range of projects and initiatives to promote an active, healthy and supported community, future-proof sites and encourage participation. These include the construction of new sports pavilions at:

- Souter Reserve in Dingley (\$2.45 million)
- GR Bricker Reserve in Moorabbin (\$2 million),
- Aspendale Sports Ground Pavilion (\$1.8 million), and
- Chadwick Reserve in Dingley (\$2.7 million)

This year's budget also includes \$1.8 million towards the construction of a pavilion at Roy Dore Reserve in Carrum, as part of a \$9 million commitment to overhaul the precinct.

"One of the major projects we're investing in, is the redevelopment of the Mentone Life Saving Club and precinct," said Cr Staikos. "We've allocated \$11.8 million in this budget towards the \$14.5 million project which will future-proof this well-used community asset and enable everyone to access our beautiful Mentone foreshore area." Council has also allocated funding to develop a new regional playground at Peter Scullin Reserve in Mordialloc.

"We're also continuing to invest in Council's long-held commitment to create a Chain of Parks in our Green Wedge through projects like the creation of a new park for the community at Elder Street South Reserve in Clarinda," Cr Staikos said.

The Draft Budget features provisions to improve the accessibility of the city's Scout and Girl Guides Halls and renewal of Kingston's footpaths, roads and drainage networks. These vital works are part of Council's ongoing and significant investment in community asset renewal.

A Council Meeting will be held on Tuesday 15 June 2021 at 6.30pm to hear presentations of submissions received on the Draft Budget. The Draft Budget will be considered for formal adoption at a Council Meeting at 7pm on Monday 28 June.

### Proactive planning review findings made public

Council has released a summary of a recent probity review into planning matters at the City of Kingston. The review, which was finalised in February 2021, found no evidence of improper conduct at Kingston Council. Council engaged Lawyers Holding Redlich to conduct the extensive review following the revelations at the City of Casey which led to the Council's sacking, with Kingston Council keen to reassure the community that no similar concerns existed in Kingston.

Kingston's \$245,000 independent probity review looked into any local planning matters that involved key players from IBAC's Operation Sandon investigation in Casey.

A summary of the findings of the review has now been shared with all participants in the review and made public for all to see. Council also provided a copy of the full report to IBAC and the Victorian Ombudsman's Office.

Kingston Mayor Steve Staikos said Councillors called for the independent probity review to give the community confidence that proper planning processes were followed at Kingston.

"I'm pleased to report that the review found no evidence of improper conduct," said Cr Staikos. "We take these issues very seriously and wanted to ensure our community had full confidence in local planning processes."

Importantly the summary report states:

"Based upon the interviews and the review of the available documentation, Holding Redlich concluded that the conduct reportedly occurring at the City of Casey does not appear to have occurred, nor is occurring, at the City of Kingston.

Whilst some Council interviewees have had dealings with the Operation Sandon identified persons, and despite some interviewees making allegations in relation to corruption and misconduct by certain Councillors or officers, Holding Redlich did not find conclusive evidence of wide scale improper conduct, corrupt conduct, or misconduct. All interviewees denied ever having received financial incentives or undisclosed political donations."

"The lawyers' review also provided 13 recommendations on how to further strengthen planning processes to provide additional protection, these are now being implemented," Cr Staikos said.

The recommendations included:

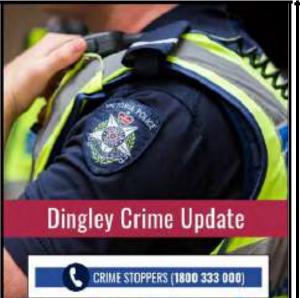
- Maintaining a register of any Councillor meetings with lobbyists
- Developing/reviewing political donation disclosure policy

- Randomly reviewing planning applications for auditing purposes
- Providing ongoing ethics training for Councillors and officers
- Providing training for Councillors on the Victorian Planning system
- Defining which senior officers should attend meetings with applicants
- Documenting all meetings with external parties and lobbyists
- Ensuring adequate process to report suspected
  misconduct
- Developing a framework to guide Councillor 'call ins' of planning applications
- Adopting policy on election campaign return forms
- Considering planning panel recommendations and providing a transparent approach if a recommendation is not followed
- Considering ways to enhance relationships between Councillors and officers.

#### Kingswood Golf Course - The Current Situation

DVCA is proud to represent a community, which has shown such sustained strength and unity in opposing the proposed rezoning and development of Kingswood Golf Course.

The Save Kingswood group, together with many members of our community, and supported by our local politicians, worked countless hours to stop the inappropriate development of Kingswood Golf Course, resulting in Council abandoning the proposed rezoning of Kingswood in October 2018, following a record number of objections, approximately 8000 objections, having been made by the community against the rezoning of Kingswood Golf Course for residential development.

#### Since 2018

- Australian Super has continued to own Kingswood Golf Course
- Kingswood Golf Course remains zoned Special Use Golf Course and is not zoned residential
- State Government has established a Golf Course Standing Advisory Committee to implement newly developed Golf Course Development Guidelines for Melbourne

#### **Current Situation**

- DVCA awaits a new development proposal from Kingswood's owner, Australian Super of our golf course.
- "After considering a range of options, Australian Super has decided to develop a new proposal for the site in line with the government's Planning Guidelines for the Conversion of Golf Course Land to Other Purposes." <u>https://dingleyvillage3172.com.au/</u> <u>background/</u>
- Our community's fight to save Kingswood Golf Course is not over.

Please remember why Dingley Village topped the list in Kingston for livability - we need to stay strong as a community to protect our unique village and continue the fight against the development of Kingswood Golf Course and the destruction of this precious environment in the heart of our village.

A terrific turnout of volunteers, including local scouts, got our community planting working bee at Spring Rd Reserve off to a flying start in April - great teamwork everyone! Perpetrators include financial scammers who take advantage of victims' lack of familiarity with technology and/or family members who pressure victims to hand over money or assets by preying on their emotions.

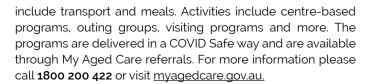
The new elder law service is staffed by lawyers from PCLC and prominent Australian law firm Russell Kennedy and offers advice on common issues including:

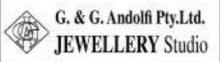
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## **DINGLEY VILLAGE HISTORICAL SOCIETY**

#### **Dingley Village Historical Society**

It was in 1996, that many of the Dingley Village Community met to discuss "public art in our own Village".

To "test the waters" and interest, we employed artist Hedley Potts to design, build and erect a mural on our supermarket wall.

He initially completed 4 mural figures

- the skater
- the pelican
- the child
- the spoonbill

Hedley's work was outstanding! He both designed, developed and installed the mural you see today – with an official opening in 1997. When the supermarket was being redeveloped, we had fears for the mural, but with the cooperation of Woolworths, it remains today. This is an interesting anecdote from Hedley himself:

Just one initial visit to this supermarket wall, driving past a few remaining market gardens and the Moorabbin Airport, then returning via Braeside Park wetlands, immediately formed ideas quite clearly. The local history research followed to focus generalisations into particular detail.

"Where on earth do you get your ideas?" asked a visitor to the studio looking at a 2M chalk drawing of a spoonbill going shopping. Well that's the easy part. Refining that chalk drawing, building it low relief, reinforcing it, colouring and firing it, glazing it and mounting it, that's difficult. On the table, on the floor, climbing a ladder to pretend to see the horizontal as vertical, and through all those months retaining its life and vitality, that's also difficult, but great fun.

It would have been easy to deliver the 106 finished pieces of clay to Dingley Village, then return to see the mural completed without dirtying my hands.

But then I would have missed the reactions day by day as it unfolded. Familiar faces, adults and children returning each day to "see the next episode". The children had an advantage, they greeted me by name. They had a preview at school. They were most fascinated with Harry Hawker's apple catchers, and were impatient to see their hit – the – future – the skateboarder wearing the Dingley Village logo designed by their classmate. And the tiny tots eagerly pointing their parents up to these giants on the wall verified art as communication. It was street theatre, and the audience rewarded the artist.

Some remembered when Mrs Weir had the only shop in Dingley Village, others remembered Gartside's cannery. They wanted to know about Harry Hawker and were proud of this local lad who became an international hero. Nobody knew much about the Bunurong.

They wondered where Dingley Grange might have been, and why Mary Attenborough's brick house hadn't been preserved. We talked about the steel tracks which made it easier for the horses to pull cartloads of vegetables all the way to the city markets, and the wooden pipes watering the market gardens from the spring, namesake of Springvale and Spring Road. As an artist I'm concerned with line and form, colour and texture, composition and movement. I want all these elements to support the communication of art and ideas.

I want the audience to enjoy using it as much as I, the artist, have enjoyed making it. I hope it challenges them as much as it has challenged me. This has been a most rewarding and satisfying project.

The Mordialloc Freeway is close to its projected completion date, and the full extent of the construction is highly visible - especially to Braeside Park's visitors as they walk along the Howard Road and Cypress Avenue trails. The bright red cement underpass from the business estate bleeds in past the Rangers' Office perilously sideswiped by the Freeway.

Gone are the scattering of mature River Red Gums that graced that edge of the Park and provided homes for generations of bats, insects, possums, lizards and birds. We were told that specialists had inspected the vegetation, over 3,000 trees, along the construction path and assessed them for their visual and ecological value and life expectancy. They were found wanting, so "Down with them!"

Of course, as with clearing any native vegetation, the contractor was required to replace or offset it to the same ecological value to Victoria's biodiversity. (Is your home, Reader, that replaceable?) Anyway, Major Project Roads Victoria acquired native vegetation offsets for the project. They will in fact be planted at Devilbend Reservoir in Tuerong - 32.5km away as the crow flies, 40km by car.

"The vegetation communities that secured offsets at Devilbend Reserve were for Grassy Woodland, Swampy Riparian Woodland and Lowland Forest. Seed was collected from native trees, shrubs and grasses from within the project area to be replanted within the project area, where possible." (If we are to believe the Major Roads Project Victoria's website seeds were collected before the construction began.)

"A Design and Construction (D&C) Contract was awarded to McConnell Dowell Constructors (Aust) Pty Ltd & Decmil Southern Pty Ltd on the 1st October 2019. Construction commenced on 28 October 2019." So, if I have this correct, from the 1 - 28 October 2020 seeds were collected. Ask any botanist or even community nursery group if it is possible to collect seeds from all the relevant vegetarian communities along the course of the Freeway in 27 days in October! Even home gardeners know that plants produce seeds at different periods throughout the year.

"A decision issued on 27 August 2019 determined that the project (Mordialloc Freeway) was a 'controlled action' requiring assessment and approval. The first compliance report to be prepared for the Mordialloc Freeway and related to the period 1 October 2019 to 28 October 2020 or year one of the action. At the time of publishing this report the project is approximately 40% complete and construction is expected to be complete late 2021."

Where did the seeds go? The answer was to community groups, if not The Friends of Braeside Park's nursery! The Mens' Shed got some eucalyptus trunks to turn into seating and some trunks were placed in the wetlands like graveyard monuments to provide resting places for waterbirds. I have not seen one resting on one of these yet! The Friends of Braeside Park sat on the Major Roads Projects Victoria Mordialloc Freeway Community Reference Group since its conception. We argued strongly against the construction of the Freeway and were and are bitterly disappointed with the State Government's choice to place built environments over conserving the remnant natural ecosystems in a classified Green Wedge area. Covid 19 restrictions proved how vital those lost green spaces were and how unnecessary was another 9 kilometres of Freeway!

Our group's decision was to work within the system to try and get the best deal for the Park because no one else will. Does this mean we were kept informed? Yes, if we asked the right question and persisted and read all the carefully crafted published reports and believed all the public servants' guarded replies.

Andrew McNee, Assistant Secretary of Assessments and Goverance Branch Department of the Environment and Energy Approval signed off the agreements from 27 August 2019 to 31 December 2040 with a list of compliance statements of course. (1 October 2020 Mordialloc Freeway Project, Victoria Compliance Report 01 (28 October 2019 to 28 October 2020).

The Major Roads Projects Victoria gang will soon move on to set up some other major road project Reference Committee and possibly even believe that they are keeping the community informed but we, the residents, will be left with 9 kilometres of Freeway of traffic (Dingley Bypass to South Road to Nepean Hwy) and a diminished Park and surrounding Green Wedge.

The Government and developers will then point out that with access to this freeway surely more residential development is warranted! And there goes the Green Wedge – football fields and club rooms, train stabling yards, concrete crushing facility, and who knows what else the State Government has agreed to grant building rights to construct.
